## Holidays and Cultural Observances

South Windsor Public Schools encourages all students and staff to appreciate and be respectful of each other's heritage and cultural diversity. The curriculum at every level presents opportunities to provide learning experiences which help create awareness and sensitivity toward a variety of holidays, celebrations and cultural observances. The following is intended to provide information regarding not only the secular holidays on which South Windsor schools are closed, but also regarding the major festivals and holy days for many of the religious traditions represented in the South Windsor community. Faculty will make appropriate accommodations for students affected by these and other special observance days.

Holidays in red denote days on which schools are closed.

| 2023-2024 Dates | Holiday/Observance Religion/Holiday - Description |

| June 29, 2023 | Eid al-Adha * <br> Islamic - The "Feast of Sacrifice" concludes the Hajj (pilgrimage to Mecca), and is a 3-day festival recalling Ibrahim's willingness to sacrifice his son in obedience to God. |
| July 4, 2023 | Independence Day <br> U.S. Holiday - Anniversary of the United States Declaration of Independence in 1776. |
| July 19, 2023 | Muharram <br> Islamic - Beginning of the new year based on the Islamic lunar calendar. Celebrates the hegira, the flight of the prophet Muhammad from Mecca to Medina. |
| July 28, 2023 | Ashura <br> Muslim - For Shias, a commemoration of the martyrdom of Hussein, a grandson of the Prophet Muhammad, at Karbala. |
| September 4, 2023 | Labor Day <br> U.S. Holiday - Celebrated the first Monday in September in recognition of U.S. workers. |
| September 6, 2023 | Janmashtami <br> Hindu - Celebrates the birthday of Lord Krishna, the 8th incarnation of the God Vishnu |
| September 16-17, 2023 | Rosh Hashanah * <br> Jewish - Beginning of the Jewish New Year and first of the High Holy Days; marks the beginning of a 10-day period of repentance and spiritual renewal. |
| September 25, 2023 | Yom Kippur * <br> Jewish - The holiest day in Judaism - the "Day of Atonement" marks the end of the Ten Days of Repentance that begin with Rosh Hashanah. |
| September 27, 2023 | Mawlid an-Nabi <br> Islamic - The observance of the birthday of Islam founder Prophet Muhammad, which occurs in Ragvi' al-awwal, the third month in the Islamic calendar. (Celebrated five days later by Shite Muslims.) |
| $\begin{aligned} & \text { September } 30 \text { - October 6, } \\ & 2023 \end{aligned}$ | Sukkot * <br> Jewish - "Feast of Tabernacles" commemorates the 40-year wandering of the Israelites in the desert on the way to the Promised Land. |
| October 7, 2023 | Shemini Atzeret * <br> Jewish - "Eighth Day of Assembly," observed on the day immediately following Sukkot. |
| October 8, 2023 | Simchat Torah * <br> Jewish - "Rejoicing in the Torah" celebrates the conclusion of the public reading of the Pentateuch and its beginning anew. |
| October 9, 2023 | Indigenous Peoples Day |
| October 15-24, 2023 | Navratri <br> Hindu - Nine day festival celebrating the triumph of good over evil. |

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| November 11, 2023 <br> (observed on Friday, November 10) | Veterans Day <br> U.S. Holiday - Honors the U.S. Armed Services and commemorates the war dead. |
| November 12, 2023 | Diwali <br> Hindu - "Festival of Lights" is the most important Hindu festival of the year and the beginning of a five-day period which honors various Hindu gods and goddesses. It celebrates the victory of good over evil, light over darkness, and knowledge over ignorance. |
| November 23, 2023 | Thanksgiving Day <br> U.S. Holiday - Following a 19th century tradition, it commemorates the Pilgrims harvest feast in the autumn of 1621. |
| December 8-15, 2023 | Hanukkah * <br> Jewish - Eight-day holiday commemorating the victory of the Jews, led by the Maccabees, over the Greeks in 165 B.C.E and the rededication of the temple. |
| December 25, 2023 | Christmas <br> Christian (U.S. Holiday) - Celebration of the birth of Jesus by Protestants and Roman Catholics. |
| December 26, 2023 January 1, 2024 | Kwanzaa <br> African American - The celebration honors African heritage in African-American culture, and is observed from December 26 to January 1, culminating in a feast and gift-giving. |
| January 1, 2024 | New Year's Day <br> U.S. Holiday - The first day of the year in the Gregorian calendar. |
| January 6, 2024 | Epiphany (Three Kings Day) <br> Christian - Western church associated Epiphany with the journey of the Magi to the infant Jesus; the Eastern church, with the baptism of Jesus by John. |
| January 15, 2024 | Martin Luther King Jr. Day U.S. Holiday - The birthday of civil rights activist Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. is celebrated on the third Monday in January. |
| February 14, 2024 | Ash Wednesday <br> Christian -Beginning of Lent, a 40-day period of spiritual preparation for Easter, not counting Sundays. |
| February 19, 2024 | President's Day <br> U.S. Holiday - Honors all past presidents of the United States of America. |
| March 8, 2024 | Maha Shivaratri <br> Hindu - Hindu festival honoring Shiva, the god of destruction; celebrates his wedding anniversary and the night of his celestial dance. |
| March 11 - April 9, 2024 | Ramadan (Beginning) * <br> Islamic - A month of strict fasting from dawn until dusk in honor of the first revelations of the Qur'an to the Prophet Muhammad. |
| March 24, 2024 | Purim* <br> Jewish - The "Feast of Lots" marks the salvation of the Jews of ancient Persia from extermination. |
| March 25, 2024 | Holi <br> Hindu - Hindu annual festival that celebrates spring and commemorates various events in Hindu mythology. |
| March 29, 2024 | Good Friday <br> Christian - Friday preceding Easter Sunday; commemorates the day of Jesus' crucifixion. |
| March 31, 2024 | Easter <br> Christian - Celebrates the resurrection of Jesus. Easter falls at some point between late March and late April each year. |
| April 6, 2024 | Laylat al-Qadr * <br> Islamic - The "Night of Power" marks the night in which God first revealed the Qur'an to the Prophet Muhammad. |
| May 3, 2024 | Orthodox Good Friday |

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| April 10, 2024 | Eid al-Fitr (End of Ramadan) * <br> Islamic - The "Feast of the Breaking of the Fast" marks the end of Ramadan, the holy month of fasting from dawn <br> until dusk. |
| April 17, 2024 | Rama Navami <br> Hindu - Celebration of the birth of Rama, king of India, and one of the incarnations of the God Vishnu. |
| April 23-30, 2024 | Passover * <br> Jewish - Eight-day "Feast of Unleavened Bread" celebrates Israel's deliverance from Egyptian bondage. The first <br> two days of Passover are usually considered the most important days of the period. |
| May 5, 2024 | Greek Orthodox Easter |
| May 27, 2024 | Memorial Day <br> U.S. Holiday - Initiated originally to honor the dead of the Civil War, this observance now pays homage to the <br> dead of all U.S. wars. |
| Shavuot * <br> Jewish - The "Feast of Weeks" celebrates the covenant established at Sinai between God and Israel, and the <br> revelation of the Ten Commandments. |  |
| June 19, 2024 | Juneteenth <br> A holiday celebrated on June 19th to commemorate the emancipation of enslaved people in the U.S. |
